A graduate of the University of Tokyo, Faculty of Medicine; he was a professor of medicine at the School of Medicine of UCLA (1979-1984), at the University of Tokyo (1989-1996), the Dean of the School of Medicine at Tokai University (1996-2002), President of Science Council of Japan (2003-2006), Science Advisor to the Prime Minister (2006-2008), Executive member of many national and international professional societies, WHO Commissioner (2005-2009), Institute of Medicine of National Academies of Sciences of USA; and Chairman of Fukushima Nuclear Accident Independent Investigation Commission by the National Diet of Japan (December 2011 – July 2012).

Michael W. Hodin, PhD is CEO of the Global Coalition on Aging, Managing Partner at High Lantern Group, and a Fellow at Oxford University's Harris Manchester College.

From 1976-80, Mike was Legislative Assistant to Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan. During this period he was also a Visiting Scholar at Brookings Institution, on U.S. Foreign Economic Policy. He was a senior executive at Pfizer, Inc. for 30 years, where he created and then led its International Public Affairs and Public Policy operations and served on Management Boards for a number of its businesses.

Mike is a Member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and from 2010-2013, was Adjunct Senior Fellow with a focus on population aging. Mike was the recipient of the 2012 Fred D. Thompson Award from the American Federation for Aging Research. He sits on the Boards of the Foreign Policy Association, Business Council for International Understanding, American Skin Association, American Federation for Aging Research and Emigrant Savings Bank, where he is Chairman of its compensation committee. Mike was a member of the World Economic Forum's Global Agenda Council on Ageing. And he sits on the Advisory Board for the Milken Institute Center for the Future of Aging.

Mike holds a BA, cum laude, Cornell University, M.Sc. in International Relations from The London School of Economics and Political Science, and M.Phil and Ph.D. in Political Science from Columbia University.

**Ryoji Noritake**

CEO, Board Member, Health and Global Policy Institute

Mr. Ryoji Noritake is CEO and board member of Health and Global Policy Institute (HGPI). He also serves as a pro-bono consultant for Project HOPE, a US-based medical humanitarian aid organization. Through HOPE and HGPI, he has led health system strengthening projects in the Asia-Pacific region and engaged in US Navy's medical humanitarian projects. Keisuke Suzuki

State Minister of Finance, Government of Japan

On 22nd of October 2017, SUZUKI Keisuke was re-elected to the Member of the House of Representatives and he was appointed to the State Minister of Finance since October 2018.

During his second and third term, he served as the Parliamentary Vice-Minister of Land, Infrastructure, Transport and Tourism, the Parliamentary Vice-Minister of Cabinet Office, the Ranking member of the Committee on Foreign Affairs, and the Committee on Rules and Administration in the House of Representatives. He also had been appointed to the Head of Youth Division, the Deputy Secretary-General, the Acting Director of Finance Policy Division, Foreign Policy Division, Environment Policy Division and also the Deputy Director-General of International Bureau in LDP.

Keisuke is known as a principal member of the Working Team on North Korean issues, Structural Reform of Budget (Road Construction) and Corporate Tax Reform. He belongs to Former Prime Minister Aso's group.

Before he elected to the Member of the House of Representatives in September 2005, he had worked as a government official for the Ministry of Finance (MOF) since 1999. He mainly worked in the division of international finance and development policy. He also had experience of working as Examiner of Fukuoka Regional Taxation Bureau, Vice Council & Financial Attache at Consulate General of Japan in New York and Policy Section Chief of the Employment Measures for the Elderly and Persons with Disabilities Department for the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare.

He studied political science and international law in the Faculty of Law, University of Tokyo, where he got his Bachelor degree. But mainly he spent his years as the crew of the Rowing team of University of Tokyo. He also spent a year as a Fellow in Foreign Service at Georgetown University.

He lives in Yokohama and serves as the Member of the House of the Representatives for Kanagawa 7th District. He is also the Intellectual Member of the Policy Council, The Japan Forum on International Relations, Inc. and the Secretary-General of GLOBE Japan.

Pekka Orpana

Ambassador-designate of Finland to Japan

Ambassador Orpana graduated with a Master of Laws from the University of Helsinki in 1979. From 1979 to 1982, he worked as a lawyer in the District Courts of Helsinki and Janakkala, and in the Municipalities of Helsinki, Lahti and Kolari. In 1982, he was integrated into the diplomatic service of the Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Finland. From 1982 to 1983, he served as Attaché at the Legal Department of the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, at the Consulate of Finland in Marseille from 1983 to 1984, and at the Office for the Western European Integration of the Ministry for Foreign Affairs from 1984 to 1985. From 1985 to 1988, he was the Second Secretary of the Embassy of Finland in Algiers, and from 1988 to 1991, the First Secretary at the Embassy of Finland in London. He served again as First Secretary at the Office of Russia and the Commonwealth of Independent States at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs from 1991 to 1994. He then was Counsellor at the Mission of Finland to the United Nations in New York from 1994 to 1997, and Counsellor and Deputy Chief of Mission at the Embassy of Finland in Pretoria from 1997 to 2001. From 2002 to 2007, he was Director of the Office of Central and South-Eastern Europe at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. From 2007 to 2011, he served as Ambassador of Finland in Lima, which was accredited to Peru, Ecuador, and Bolivia. From 2011 to 2015, he was Ambassador in Belgrade, which was accredited to Serbia and Montenegro, and Ambassador and Senior Adviser on Energy External Relations and Climate Change Policies at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs from 2015 to 2018. Since September 2018, he has been serving as Ambassador in Tokyo.

Before becoming Director of the WHO Kobe Centre, she worked on strategic policy issues with the World Health Organization, including as Senior Health Policy Advisor in the Office of the Regional Director for Africa, WHO Representative to South Africa, Team Leader for Health Systems Development in China, and Health Policy Advisor in Indonesia and Cambodia. Prior to working with WHO in China, she was managing evaluation research at the University of California Berkeley's Institute of Business and Economic Research, and the National Institute of Public Health in Mexico.

In South Africa, China, Indonesia and Mexico, she developed programs of technical cooperation and research to advance reforms to achieve universal health coverage. Over the past 25 years, she has published widely on diverse topics in health economics and policy analysis, including the role of the private health care sector, conditional cash transfers, human resources, insurance and provider payment reforms, quality of care assessments, policies for essential medicines, monitoring and evaluation, migration, and fiscal policies.

A native English speaker, she enjoys learning languages and has studied Spanish, Khmer, Thai, and Indonesian.



David Gossack

Vice President for Asia at the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

David Gossack, vice president for Asia at the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, develops Chamber programs and policies across the region. He concurrently serves as president of the U.S.-Japan Business Council (USJBC) and president of the U.S.-Korea Business Council (USKBC) where he helps lead U.S. business engagement with two of America's most important trading partners.

Prior to joining the Chamber, Gossack spent more than 24 years in Asia as one of America's most senior commercial diplomats and an advocate for American business interests. He served in East Asia's largest economies before retiring in July 2018 as a career member of the Senior Foreign Service, Minister-Counselor rank. He served in Tokyo, Bangkok, Beijing, Seoul, Jakarta and Shanghai and received many awards for distinguished performance including the Commerce Department's Gold Medal.

Earlier, Gossack was legislative counsel to Sen. Spark Matsunaga (D-HI) during his chairmanship of the Senate Finance Committee's International Trade Subcommittee, and he was a participant in drafting major trade legislation in the 100th and 101st Congresses. Also, he served as a foreign service officer for the State Department holding positions in Washington, Tokyo, and at the USTR's Office of Japan Affairs. Gossack is a native of San Jose, California, and a graduate of Stanford University and the University of Washington School of Law. He resides in Potomac, Maryland.

Akihisa Harada

Dr. Akihisa Harada is the President & Representative Director of Pfizer Japan Inc. (December, 2017~). He joined Pfizer as Director for Clinical Research in 1999. He became the acting Head of Regulatory from 2004 and the Head of Clinical Research from 2005. In 2008 he was appointed to the Vice President of Development Japan. In addition to his role as the head of Development Japan, he was also a Chief Scientist in Pfizer Japan, responsible for leading Pfizer's interactions within Japan's scientific community and associated stakeholders. Mitsunobu R Kano

Professor and a Vice Executive Director, Okayama University.

Dr. Kano has experienced clinical medicine including gerontology, research in medical engineering and pharmaceutical sciences, and public services including academy activities and governmental commitments. The public services led him to efforts in developing education for general sciences, including implementation of achieving the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) into university administration in Okayama University. Dr. Kano graduated from and started research activity in University of Tokyo, did his clinical residency in St. Luke's International Hospital, and is now Professor and a Vice Executive Director in Okayama University. Currently Mrs. Kohn is the World Health Organization Age-Friendly DC Coordinator. She is responsible to the Mayor for implementing with WHO guidance, the District's transformation to an easier jurisdiction in which to grow up and grow older. In November 2017, after five years of listening, planning, implementing government and community-wide strategies, the World Health Organization and its United States agent, AARP joined the Mayor at a press conference to recognize the outstanding work completed by Age-Friendly DC.

Over the last year Mrs. Kohn facilitated the establishment of the city's second five-year strategic plan. Age-Friendly DC 2023 is built around three pillars: Improving the Built Environment, Changing Attitudes about Growing Older, and Lifelong Health and Security. The plan was recently presented to DC residents and WHO by the Mayor. Implementation has already begun.

Throughout her career, Kohn has planned and administered innovative residences and programs for people who have reached 60 and beyond. Matt McEnany joined HGPI in 2018. He is responsible for the Institute's work on antimicrobial resistance and emerging healthcare innovations. Paul McGarry

Head, Greater Manchester Ageing Hub and Age friendly Manchester, Manchester City Council

Paul McGarry is the Head of the Greater Manchester Ageing Hub, part of the Greater Manchester Combined Authority tasked with making Greater Manchester the UK's first Age-Friendly city region. Since 2003 he has led the Age Friendly Manchester Programme at Manchester City Council, formerly called Valuing Older People. Under Paul's leadership, Manchester became the first UK city to achieve WHO Age Friendly status and was a founding member of both the WHO's Global Network of Age-Friendly Cities and Communities and the UK Network of Age-Friendly Cities.



Takaoh Miyagawa

Senior Leader, Corporate Management, AEGON Sony Life Insurance Co., Ltd.

Born in Yokohama, Kanagawa, Japan. MBA from Yale School of Management with emphasis on finance and investment.

Joined Aegon Sony Life in December 2011 and has been engaged in the annual global retirement research, the AEGON Retirement Readiness Survey, in collaboration with AEGON and Aegon Center for Longevity and Retirement for seven years since 2012. This survey examines retirement insecurities around the world, and found that while due to aging population the governmental pensions and traditional corporate DB pension plans are under financial strain and individuals are expected to take on increasing risk and responsibility for self-funding a greater portion of their retirement, many people, however, are inadequately equipped to successfully do so and are therefore at risk of not achieving a financially secure retirement.

He has been in the retirement industry for more than 20 years, from the DB corporate pension fund management, the DC pension plan management, and the variable annuity life insurance business. As a former researcher in finance, he was specialized in the asset-liability management of the pension fund and the asset allocation of investment fund with strong knowledge of investment theories, financial engineering and financial modeling.

Spends his free time riding bicycles, watching baseball games in his hometown of Yokohama, and also supporting his favorite Yokohama football club on weekends.



Hiroaki Miyata

Professor of Health Policy and Management, School of Medicine, Keio University

Dr. Hiroaki Miyata is Professor of Health Policy and Management at the School of Medicine at Keio University, and is Director of Global Health Systems and Innovation at National Center of Global Health and Medicine. After receiving his doctoral degree in Epidemiology, he has worked as a faculty in the Department of Healthcare Quality Assessment at the Graduate School of Medicine, the University of Tokyo which he currently remains affiliated to as an Adjunct Professor. He has been involved in numerous studies related to the assessment and improvement of healthcare quality in Japan using the national clinical database which is a nationwide clinical registry database that he had actively participated as one of the main leaders in its development.
